A Message From the Chair



Dear Members and Supporters;

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of our management and staff as well as our volunteer board and committee members, I am pleased to advise that 2017 was a successful year for Manuels River Natural Heritage Society, its members and supporters. We continued to deliver on our mission related to education, conservation and recreation at Manuels River.

As demonstrated by this year's annual report, Manuels River, including our world class interpretation centre and trails, has truly become an essential part of the social, recreational, educational, tourism and business life of the Northeast Avalon in general and the Town of Conception Bay South in particular. We have continued to do more and do better in all areas, including school field trips, summer camps, events and admissions. Our 2017 Bobber Race Day and the Giv'er on the River Fun Run events were great successes and truly engaged families in our community. Every day we receive smiles and enthusiastic feedback from our members, visitors and supporters.

Thanks to support from ACOA, the Provincial Government and the Town of CBS, 2017 saw the completion of the majority of Phase One of our Trails Master Plan and an enthusiastic response from users of the trails to these improvements. Our new display for the giant Manuels River trilobite fossil donated by Dr. Riccardo Levi -Setti opened in 2017 and has been warmly received by visitors to our exhibits. Plus, we retired our capital loan in July 2017 and move forward into 2018 with no capital debt.

As forecasted in last year's message, this annual report demonstrates that we continued to deliver high quality educational programming and our overall usage numbers remained solid during 2017. However, the weakening economic environment in our province had an impact on our operating revenues and the level of funding from third parties. In response, we made every effort to contain costs while making sure that visitor's experiences were not negatively impacted.

We are now looking forward with optimism to 2018 and beyond. We are very pleased that our key financial supporters, the Town of CBS and the Hibernia Management & Development Company, have provided four-year financial commitments for 2018-2021 for operational expenses and education programming support respectively. These commitments are essential for us to be able to maintain our high quality programs and services over the next four years. We are optimistic that as the economy improves that other governments, not for profits, business and individuals will be able to resume or begin financial support as well. This future support will be key to fulfilling our key visions like the completion of the Trails Master Plan, additional parking and capital improvements at the Centre, sooner, rather than later.

During 2018, Manuels River's board, management and staff will be dedicated to continuing to deliver on our important mission while at the same time returning the Society to a break-even operating result.

On behalf of the Board I wish to thank our members, volunteers and donors for supporting Manuels River.

I hope to see you at the Centre and on the Trails during 2018!

Executive Director's Report



In 2017 more than 31,000 people visited the Manuels River Hibernia Interpretation Centre to take part in education and community programming, to celebrate important life milestones with family and friends, and to gather with work colleagues in the tranquil setting of the Manuels River valley. Additionally, thousands more people walked along the Manuels River trails and visited Coffee Matters café. The weakening economic environment impacted sales revenue and the amount of grant money received in 2017. However, we continued the delivery of high quality programming and visitor experiences while improving and expanding our offerings. Through diligent planning and efforts to contain costs, 2017 was a strong year despite the economic environment, and we have reason to be very optimistic for the continued growth of the operation in 2018 and beyond.

In 2017, despite the loss or reduction of major education programming grants, we continued to deliver our suite of popular education programs and put in a considerable effort to review our programs to improve and plan for future years. Student visits for our school curriculum-linked program reached the 10,000 milestone since the Centre opened in 2013. We also made changes to the structure of some public education programs which will be rolled out in 2018. A renewed 4-year STEM education programming grant from Hibernia Management and Development Company for 2018 to 2021 puts us in a great position as we continue to grow our education offerings.

The Manuels River Hibernia Interpretation Centre and its natural surroundings continue to be a popular place for couples to hold their weddings. The past year saw an increase in the number of private functions held at the Centre. While the economic environment resulted in lower numbers of corporate clients using the Centre in 2017, we developed more in-house programming to bring more activity to the Centre and we look forward to offering these new programs in 2018.

We continue to work with local artists, artisans and suppliers to produce Manuels River specific and local items for sale in the Gift Store. Store sales increased in 2017 over 2016, an indication that the Gift Store is becoming a destination of its own for visitors and locals looking for a unique children's education toy, and piece of local artwork, or jewelry.

The majority of Phase 1 of the Manuels River Trail Master Plan was completed in 2017 and the remainder of Phase 1 will be completed in early 2018. We are in the process of planning for the implementation of Phase 2 which will proceed in 2018 subject to available funding and project donations. Feedback from trail users on the results of Phase 1 upgrades has been glowing. Upgrades have resulted in a noticeable increase in trail usage and has allowed for more leaning spaces and teachable moments in our education programs. In Phase 1 of the Trail Master Plan, we are upgrading sections of both Canyon Trail and Ocean Trail. In Phase 2, we plan to finish upgrading and expansion of Ocean Trail, followed by upgrading and expansion of Canyon Trail in Phase 3 to conclude this major capital project.

Given the economic environment, our accomplishments in 2017 are a result of the amazing people associated with Manuels River – management and staff who look forward to welcoming and servicing all visitors in a friendly, helpful manner; the dedicated individuals who sit on the volunteer Board of Directors and board committees; the many other volunteers who assist with programming, fundraising events and other tasks around the Centre and along the trails; and the many community-minded individuals who regularly use and support the Centre. In 2018, we will continue to work together to enjoy and share this special





Education





Due to funding constraints, 2017 was a year of program review and maintenance, with a goal of sustaining 2016 levels of program participation and quality, while planning for growth in 2018. Despite this uncertainty, our dedicated education staff continued to offer quality educational programming to children and adults alike at the centre.



This past fall, Manuels River employed interns from both Academy Canada and The Conservation Corps of Newfoundland and Labrador. We also hosted a group of pre-service teachers to observe experiential learning and pilot high school science project.

These interns enjoyed their time at Manuels River so much that two of them chose to stay on as part-time staff!

School Curriculum-Linked Programs

Our curriculum-linked school programs include interpretive hikes and hands-on science experiments which focus on various aspects of the Manuels River valley such as geology, biology and the natural environment. In 2017, our school programs were supported by the Hibernia Management and Development Company. In December 2017, HMDC renewed their commitment to fun Manuels River's STEM education programs with a 4-year, \$840,000 grant.

Public Education Programs

In addition to our curriculum-linked school programs, Manuels River offers public educational programming such as Young Scientist, which in 2017 saw over 500 participants. Manuels River continued to offer regular Family Fun Days in 2017. These programs, with new refreshed themes feature a significant STEM educational component and offer families the opportunity to learn about many science and nature topics together. Family Fun Days held so far included "Star Lab" and "Coding and Robotics". There are more Family Fun Days planned throughout 2018!



Science Camps

For Spring and Summer 2017, Manuels River continued to host in-house Science Camps. In 2017 we hosted one week of Spring Camp and nine weeks of Summer Camp. Registration for Science Camp was at over 80% capacity in 2017.





Visiting Groups

Throughout the summer, Manuels River welcomed 12 visiting day camps from across the Avalon Peninsula who joined us for an exciting day of learning and exploring. Throughout the year we hosted Brownies, Beavers and Scout groups for sleepovers and other educational programs. We also designed and delivered educational programs for the Association for New Canadians and hosted various other groups for exhibit and trail tours.







Venue Rentals

Exhibits



In November 2017, Manuels River placed the MR1 Fossil in its permanent home in the exhibits. This *paradoxides davidis* fossil was found at Manuels River in the 1970's by Dr. Riccardo Levi-Setti. This specimen was returned to Manuels River in 2016 and is one-of-a-kind due to its size and preservation. The MR1 fossil was unveiled during the Doors Open event in September.

As part of Canada 150, Manuels River welcomed a travelling Black Box exhibit via our partnership with Innovation 150 and the Canadian Association of Science Centres (CASC). The challenge was to discover what was happening inside the black box, without seeing inside!





Trails

In 2017, Manuels River completed the majority of Phase 1 of the Trail Master Plan with the help of government partners, donors and the work of construction contractor, The Grand Concourse Authority. Thus far, feedback on Phase 1 of the Trail Master Plan have been overwhelmingly positive. People who frequently use our trails are delighted by the improvements we are making to the trail system.

Phase 1 will conclude in the spring of 2018 with the addition of gateway signage, way finding signage and widening of the Blue Jay and Kingfisher bridges to improve access for maintenance and first responders. Contingent on funding, Phase 2 is scheduled to begin in Fall 2018.

The Master Plan consists of three phases in addition to several special projects such as an outdoor classroom and lookouts to experience outstanding views. Each phase will upgrade or expand different sections of the Canyon Trail and Ocean Trail on both sides of the river.





Treasurer's Report



On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Manuels River Natural Heritage Society Inc., I am pleased to present you with the 2017 Audited Financial Statements, which accompany this Annual Report.

The 2017 fiscal year results show a decline in our operating revenues and a net income deficit of \$42,779 which is largely attributable to the downturn in the current economic environment.

Despite this, I would characterize 2017 as a successful year since the past year has resulted in significant strides in the progress of the Society with respect to the continued development of our trail system, full payment of the outstanding balance of our capital loan on the building, and continued growth and development of our education programs.

I am encouraged with the continued support from our partners including the Town of Conception Bay South, Hibernia Management and Development Company Ltd., the provincial and federal governments, as well as our many donations and pledges from private and corporate supporters providing the Society a certain level of financial stability for the next four years.

I would like to acknowledge the dedicated efforts of our management and staff, volunteers, Board of Directors, committee members and private and corporate supporters.

I would also like to thank our stakeholders for their continued confidence and support for our organization and look forward to continued success of the Manuels River Natural Heritage Society for fiscal year 2018 and beyond.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To: The Board of Directors of the Manuels River Natural Heritage Society Inc.

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Manuels River Natural Heritage Society Inc. which comprise of the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2017 and the statements of operations and net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. Except as explained in the following paragraph, I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Basis for Qualified opinion

The organization derives revenue from the general public and fund-raising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to complete audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of this revenue was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to income, excess of expenses over income, assets and net assets.

Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of adjustments, if any, which I might have determined to be necessary had I been able to satisfy myself concerning the completeness of the revenue referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as at December 31, 2017 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the period ended December 31, 2017

1. Purpose of the Organization

The organization was incorporated on January 17, 1992 without share capital under the laws of Newfoundland and Labrador and received its charitable status on February 23, 2002. The organization is exempt from income taxes under section 149(1) e.

The activities of the Organization are restricted to those in furtherance of the following objects: To protect, enhance and preserve the entire Manuels River system, through wildlife habitat improvement, construction of an interpretation centre, the presentation of various educational programs and the development of a linear park.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Outlined below are those policies considered particularly significant for the organization.

a. Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

b. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and bank balances.

c. Property and equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Amortization is recorded on the declining-balance basis at rates which will reduce the original cost to the estimated residual value over the useful life of the assets. In the year of acquisition, amortization is provided for at one-half the following rates.

d. Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires the organization's management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and related notes to the financial statements. Actual results may differ from these estimates, however, such differences would not be expected to have a material impact on these financial statements.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

e. Fair values of Financial Instruments

The organization has evaluated fair values of its financial instruments based on the current interest rate environment, related market values and current pricing of financial instruments with comparable terms. The carrying value of financial instruments is considered to approximate fair value, unless otherwise indicated.

f. Financial Instruments - Financial Risks

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments as follows: Liquidity risk The organization main liquidity risk relates to its accounts payable. Credit risk The organizations main credit risk relates to its accounts receivables.
